Summary

Redemption, rooted in the social system of the Hebrew Bible, particularly the patriarchal culture built around the "Beit Av" or father's house. This system centers on the patriarch's responsibility to care for the extended family, ensuring their needs are met. Marginalized individuals like widows, orphans, the lost, and aliens, are disconnected from this system, and redemption involves the patriarch or the community acting to reintegrate them. God, as the ultimate patriarch, redeemed humanity from marginalization caused by sin through Jesus' sacrifice, inviting believers to partner in redeeming others, not just spiritually, but by integrating them back into the community.
