The Image

- Metaphorical Culture: The Bible's cultural context emphasizes visual and tangible representations of belief.
- Tzelem (Image): Physical representation of a deity, marking presence but not being the deity itself.
- God's Presence: Demonstrated through the Ark of the Covenant without being a physical image.
- Humanity as God's Image: Humans are intended to reflect God, a concept disrupted by sin but restored through redemption.
- Responsibility of Representation: Our actions shape how others perceive God.
- Forbidden Images: God forbids creating images of anything but humans.
- Representation vs. Replication: Images act as representations and hints, not physical and exact copies.
